<u>Jesus Is</u> <u>The Reason</u> <u>for the Season</u>

At this time of year, we hear the saying often, "Jesus is the reason for the season." It's catchy. It's heart-warming. It's reassuring. However, the hyped "season" of Christmas, which man has designated as the birth-time of Jesus, has no Scriptural basis—neither in historical record or in authoritative command from God. As some have more aptly stated, "Jesus is the reason for every reason."

Now, with that understanding, think about that saying in relationship to the "season" for which Christians do have authoritative command from God.

Jesus is the reason for the season of my behavior! In the great Sermon on the Mount, Jesus said, "You are the salt of the earth; but if the salt loses its flavor, how shall it be seasoned? It is then



good for nothing but to be thrown out and trampled underfoot by men" (Matt. 5:13). Salt was used as a preservative (and still is) to keep food from becoming putrefied or corrupted. Jesus was emphasizing in this passage that the only hope that the earth (i.e., the inhabitants and civilizations of the earth) has for preservation is the seasoning of righteousness and godly living from God's people (see also Proverbs 14:34). When it comes to my behavior, it needs to be seasoned by Jesus.

Jesus is the reason for the season of my speech! As Paul concluded one of the most practical sections in all of Scripture, he instructed Christians, "Let your speech always be gracious, seasoned with salt..." (Col. 4:6). As salt provides taste and flavor to our food, the words that we use will all have a certain taste or flavor to them—either a "corrupt word" or "what is good for necessary edification" (Col. 4:6). Another interesting characteristic of salt is that it heals, even though it may hurt or sting initially and in the process. Wisdom says, "Faithful are the wounds of a friend" (Prov. 27:6). When it comes to my speech, it needs to be seasoned by Jesus.

Jesus is the reason for the season of my preaching! The instructions given to God's servant Timothy are insightful: "Preach the word!" (2 Tim. 4:2). But when? On Sundays? Wednesdays? Special occasions? The inspired penman continued, "Be ready in season and out of season." As there is a "hunting season" and a "snowbird season," is there a "preaching season"? No! God says to preach...whether it is convenient or not...favorable or not...popular or not. When it comes to my preaching of God's Word, it needs to be seasoned by Jesus.

Are you seasoned by Jesus, seasoned with Jesus and seasoned for Jesus? He is the reason for every season!

The following are the minutes from the OCTOBER meeting of the Church Council. (There was no meeting in the month of November.) The minutes are available for you to help the entire church family Stay In The Know about how this group is caring for New Hope UMC!

October 24, 2019 - Church Council Meeting

Present: Pastor Mike, Kevin Armstrong, Cindy Deavers, Sam Arnold, Debbie Arnold, Cindy Sheets, Wanda Harding, Alicia Copeland, Karen Whitmer, Robin Craun and Bruce Rogers

The meeting was called to order by Sam Arnold, Chairperson. Devotions were shared, followed by an opening prayer. The minutes from the September 2019 meeting were accepted as distributed.

Finance Committee: (Kevin Armstrong reported)

- ~ 73% of the budget has been received.
- ~ We still owe \$29,380 on our line of credit for the new Heating and A/C System.
- ~ The Finance Committee wants to apply for a low-interest line of credit from the United Methodist Foundation. Kevin Armstrong made a motion and Karen Whitmer seconded it. It was passed and approved to have them apply for a loan from the UM Foundation at a 3.5% interest rate with no balloon payment for \$527 per month for 60 months.

Treasurer: (Cindy Deavers reported)

- ~ There is \$1,892.95 in the Wednesday Night Dinner fund.
- ~ From the 2018 and 2019 50's Drive-In Fundraisers, there is a total of \$2,782.98 in this fund.
- ~ There is \$2,366.37 in the Non-Designated fund.
- ~ There is \$2,170.56 in the Gift & Memorial fund.
- ~ Robin Craun made a motion to put the \$2,366.37 from the Non-Designated Fund and the \$2,170.56 from the Gift & Memorial Fund and add both of them, for a total of \$4,536.93 to the Building Fund to pay down some of our line of credit (which is at \$29,380). Much discussion was had and Kevin Armstrong seconded it, and it was agreed to and passed by all.

Evangelism Ministry: (Vacant - Please see Pastor Mike if you are interested in taking on this ministry.)

United Methodist Women: (Wanda Harding reported)

- ~ On October 21st, 13 members met. Guest speakers Joy Utberg and Gayle Meeks shared information on mission monies UMW provide each year. Listings of college students and shut-ins were distributed and divided between the circles. These listings are available in the Narthex.
- ~ UMW Planning Meeting is on October 28th at 1:00pm to discuss meetings and activities for 2020. All who are interested are invited to attend.
- ~ Fall Bazaar is November 9th in conjunction with HOTS. The ladies will set up on Thursday, November 7th at 6:00pm in Thee Seekers classroom. Please bring crafts and canned items but then, but wait to bring baked items on Saturday morning. Please put prices on your items. All are encouraged to participate in this, as it is the UMW's biggest fundraiser for missions throughout the year.
- ~ Circle of Hope will provide a meal for the UMM on November 19th at 6:30pm.
- ~ Church-wide covered-dish Christmas dinner is December 14th at 5:00pm

United Methodist Men: (Sam Arnold reported)

- ~ The UMM had a representative from the Valley Mission come and talk to them about their mission in the community, and they had a nice meal.
- ~ H.O.T.S. in November 9th and everything is on track
- ~ Last meeting of the UMM for 2019 will be November 19th with a representative from the Salvation Army and a meal provided by the Circle of Hope

Membership: (Karen Whitmer reported)

~ Karen reported that there have been no deaths of any church members

Communications: (Cindy Sheets reported)

~ We met again with John Riley from John's Computer Service on September 25, 2019, to finalize an estimate about our upcoming IT and internet upgrades. We received an estimate from him for \$1,671.98. Bruce Rogers and several others have agreed to pull the wires/cables that will save us approximately \$140 per hour (we look for this work to take approximately 10-15 hours to complete). Once this work is complete we will contact John again to schedule an appointment to have him and his crew come to our church to complete the IT upgrades.

Pastor's Report: (Pastor Mike reported)

- ~ Still working on getting new officers for 2020 Still need a: Lay Leader, Worship Chair, and a Church Council Chairperson
- ~ On or around November 19th, Pastor Mike will have an after worship get-together for all those interested in becoming new members of the church.
- ~ Pastor Mike will look into seeing if there is a need currently for a confirmation class for those in grades 6th and above.

- ~ Our Christmas Eve Service will be on Tuesday, December 24th at 9:00pm Where will we have lessons and sing carols, and donations to Mission Central will be accepted at this time.
- ~ Charge Conference will be on Saturday, November 2nd from 12pm-3pm, with a covered-dish lunch

Old Business:

~ Alicia reported that she went to meet with principals from Clymore and Stuart Elementary schools about interest in a possible new after school program at our church on Wednesdays. She said that the parents' would have to go to the school and sign a permission slip in order for the kids to be let off at our church.

The tentative schedule would be:

- @ 3:45pm the kids would be dropped off at our church and they would get a snack or have playtime.
- @ 4:30pm the Handbell choir would practice
- @ 5:15pm the Children's Choir would practice

The hope is that they will be able to begin this program soon, possibly in mid-November or before Christmas

New Business:

- ~ The Dunns will be returning for a third time to perform at our church on Sunday, November 8th, 2020
- ~ December 8th @ 4:00pm Austine Belsky will be performing Christmas songs and singing carols.

The meeting was closed with prayer by Pastor Mike.

Nurture Report 2019

Sweet Hour of Prayer (SHOP) continued year-round at 8:00 am on Saturday mornings. Always open to all, attendance is usually 5-7 persons. Joys, concerns, upcoming events are shared, followed by prayer. Our former pastor and new pastor have different formats but both have included scripture and a short devotion, as well as prayer, volunteer or pastor led.

We also continued our Wednesday Night dinners during the school year, with time taken off during the cold winter months and summer. The congregation, as well as the community, is invited. The meal is free but donations are accepted. Approximately 50 people attend, sometimes more, sometimes less and good fellowship is the result. The meal is prepared and served by a small group of faithful members. Our two Faith Community Nurses have occasionally provided information and blood pressure checks during this time.

An hour prior to the meal and during the summer, a Bible or book study is open to all, led by layman George Taylor. This summer we read and discussed the book Whisper by Mark Batterson. We are now studying Jonah, to be followed by Job and an Advent study.

The fifth Sunday in January was "Bring A Friend" Sunday followed by a covered-dish meal after worship. In June a farewell lunch was held in honor of Pastor Shin, followed the next Sunday by a welcome lunch for Pastor Mike. The fifth Sunday of September we celebrated Rural Life Sunday and had our annual church picnic.

A new Sunday School class, aimed particularly at those who had not been attending a class, has been started by member Jennifer Strother. Interest and participation has been good.

There have been opportunities for children to experience the love of God and their church family through activities designed for them such as trips to the Jump Park, Water Part, Vacation Bible School, and Children's Music Retreat. They participated in Children's Sabbath in a variety of ways, including readings, singing, playing the handbells and taking the offering.

Nurture provides ways to maintain a close church family and strengthens our love for God and each other through fellowship and sharing.

On May 21, 2019, we hosted a Ladies Night Out Dinner at the Wood Grill in Harrisonburg. Faithful Praise provided musical entertainment. Door prizes were awarded and all the ladies who attended were given gift bags.

June, July, and August 2019 were our UMM work nights. We performed several beautification projects around the church such as painting the parsonage porch, mulching around the church and parsonage, cleaning the garage at the parsonage, removing unwanted articles from around the church, trimming shrubs and trees and cleaning out the gutters. We also trimmed the trees around the edge of the cemetery as well as straightening a few of the tombstones and markers.



From Pastor Mike's Desk

Every year at this time we hear the same lament over and over: "Christmas has become so commercial." We hear it so often that after a while it means nothing. It's like complaining about the weather. It doesn't change anything. We may lament the influence of Madison Avenue on the season but most of us love to give gifts. When we give to others, we have the potential to be at our best. We can also be at our worst when our giving is too influenced by this season of overspending and overindulging.

Parents feel the economic pressures of trying to decide what is appropriate giving. Friends and family members fall into the trap

of looking for that "perfect" gift. Some are guilty of comparing their giving to others. Spouses often try to find the approval of their partners through their gifts.

None of us are immune to these tensions unless we withdraw from the world. And I don't think that is what God had in mind when the baby Jesus was given to us on the first Christmas. We have the most perfect example of giving in the birth of the Christ child. I hope our giving seeks to be of the same attitude.

Recently, I came across a list that might help us rethink our attitudes toward giving. I would like to share it with you.

Eight Gifts that Do No Cost a Cent

- **1.)** <u>Listening:</u> But you must REALLY listen. No interrupting, no daydreaming, no planning your response. *Just listen.*
- **2.)** Affection: Be generous with appropriate hugs, kisses, pats on the back and handholds. Let these small actions demonstrate the love you have for family and friends.
- **3.)** Laughter: Clip cartoons. Share articles and funny stories.
- **4.)** A Written Note: It can be a simple "Thanks for the help!" note or a full sonnet. A handwritten note may be remembered for a lifetime and may even change a life.
- **5.)** A Compliment: A simple and sincere, "You look great in red.", "You did a super job!", or "That was a wonderful meal." can make someone's day.
- **6.) A Favor:** Every day, go out of your way to do something kind.
- **7.)** Solitude: There are times when we want nothing better than to be left alone. Be sensitive to those times and give the gift of solitude to others.
- **8.)** A Cheerful Disposition: The easiest way to feel good is to extend a kind word to someone. Really, it's not that hard to say "Hello." or "Thank you."

We all enjoy finding a gift under the Christmas tree. It's fun to unwrap a package. However, many of the gifts we remember most cost nothing. While there is a place for presents wrapped in pretty paper as we celebrate the birth of Christ, the best gifts we can give are our selves. That's the example we have in Christ.
