The following are the minutes from the JULY meeting of the Church Council. They are available for you to help the entire church congregation <u>Stay In The Know</u> about what and how this group are caring for the people and the church building of New Hope UMC - in the past, the present and into the future!

## July 25, 2019 - Church Council Meeting

*Present:* Pastor Mike, Sam Arnold, Debbie Arnold, Robin Craun, Wanda Harding, JoEtta Walker, Susan Coffman, Teresa Barr, Dallas Vanlear, Kevin Armstrong, Cindy Sheets, Dale Rankin, Alicia Copeland, Jennifer Strother, Andy Breeding and Karen Whitmer.

The meeting was called to order by Sam Arnold, Chairperson. Devotions were shared by Sam Arnold followed by prayer from Pastor Mike. The minutes from the May 2019 meeting were accepted as distributed.

#### **Finance Committee:** (Kevin Armstrong reported)

- ~ With 55.7% of the year complete, we have received 49.3% of the projected budget.
- ~ Finance of our debt relating to the flat roof repair: We are currently relying on our line of credit at 6%. This will result in approximately \$1,800 in interest yearly until it's paid off. The UM Foundation offers capital improvement loans at reduced interest rates. The terms are 36 months at 3%, 48 months at 3.2% and 60 months and longer at 3.5%. A five year loan would result in interest on \$30,000 of \$2,745.14 and a monthly payment of \$545.75. Of course less years and less interest would save us money. Do we want to pursue this line or continue with the line of credit?
  - 4 year term payment period payment of \$2,000 in interest and a monthly payment of \$666.68
  - 3 year term payment period payment of \$1,407 interest and a monthly payment of \$872.444
- ~ All budget requests for 2020 are due at the Finance committee meeting on August 15th, at 6:00pm.

<u>Treasurer:</u> (Report given by Kevin Armstrong for Clndy Deavers. Please see the finance report that can be found in the Narthex or please see Cindy Deavers.)

- ~ Apportionments have been paid.
- ~ The credit line was paid off for the HVAC project.
- ~ A draw was made in the amount of \$27,080 to pay Don Largent Roofing. The total bill was \$32,080 and we held back \$5,000 until some repairs were made.
- ~ A check was mailed to Heifer International in the amount of \$1,160. This was a combination of funds collected during Vacation Bible School and Sunday School.

- ~ The minister moving expenses have been paid and I am not aware of any outstanding bills. The amount paid included the movers for Pastor Mike, cleaning the parsonage, doing some touch -up painting and repairs and some lodging for Pastor Shin and Hailey during their transition.
- ~ We are working on getting Pastor Mike a credit card. We are also working on getting Pastor Mike and Dale Rankin set up as signers on the discretionary account.
- ~ As a reminder, please use the reimbursement vouchers when requesting to be reimbursed for items purchased for the church. They are located in the basket on the top shelf, located in the old library.
- ~ There was discussion about obtaining another credit card, so that Pastor Mike, Teresa Barr (Trustee's Chair) and Alicia Copelnad (Music Director) could all have a separate credit card on hand to make purchases for the church.
  - Kevin Armstrong made a motion to obtain another credit card for Alicia Copeland in her role as Music Director. Karen Whitmer seconded.
    - Then further discussion was had about a concern that the credit card company may only issue a limited number of credit cards, and/or that there may be a fee associated with obtaining additional credit cards.
    - Therefore, it was agreed that this issue be tabled until further research can be done on the subject and in the meantime, Alicia Copeland will continue to use the credit card that Pastor Shin was using before he left, which expires at the end of August 2019.
- ~ Kevin Armstrong made a motion to put Pastor Mike and Dale Rankin (as Lay Leader) on the discretionary fund at Dupont Community Credit Union; and that Pastor Shin and Kim Maugans be removed from the account. It was seconded and passed.

#### **Trustees:** (Teresa Barr reported)

- ~ It was reported that there are no planned major projects upcoming in the near future.
- ~ The roofing company did some damage to our church, we got estimates as to how much those repairs would cost us to get fixed the estimate was \$5,000 in damages. Therefore, we have paid the roofing company the total cost we owed to them *Minus* the \$5,000. Once they return and fix those damages that they caused, we will pay them the remaining \$5,000; if they do not return, we will use the money that we held back from them to pay someone else to fix the damages.
- ~ The parsonage is complete; there was cleaning, painting and the floor on the porch was repaired.
- ~ Pastor Mike asked to have an office on the main floor of the parsonage. The room behind the nursery can be used for this purpose and a door can be easily installed there for privacy.
- ~ There are plans to clean out the History Room and other rooms in the church that are in need of this. If you have any personal items left in the church, please remove them. If you have church-related items that are being stored in the church, please contain those items in boxes/bins and clearly label the boxes/bins.
- ~ The carpet in the nursery will be removed; mainly to deal with sanitary issues and because it is old. A combination of tile and rug(s) will replace the carpet. Toys and other items in the nursery and the nursery's closet will be gone through, sorted and some items will be donated or disposed of.
- ~ There was an issue about leaving food in the church. Please try to avoid leaving food items in the church. If you do, please make sure these items are placed in a container that will discourage mice and insects from using these items in the church as a food source.

#### **Worship Committee:** (Susan Coffman reported)

- ~ It was reported that the Worship Committee had their first meeting with Pastor Mike. The following are some special Sundays that we will observe in the near future:

  - October 13th The Dunns will come and perform again for us.
  - October 20th Laity Sunday

  - December 22nd Christmas Cantata
  - December 24th Christmas Eve Service @ 9:00pm

#### Nurture-Spiritual Development Committee: (JoEtta Walker reported)

- ~ The Whisper Bible Study is very successful and they are about half-way through with the study. This study is being led by George Taylor.
- ~ We will have our annual Church-wide Picnic on Sunday, September 29th
- ~ There was discussion about starting an Instagram account for the church, as another outreach tool, in the hopes of attracting younger people to our church events. There was a concern raised about privacy issues, and it was recommended that we work to get permission from parents before we post pictures of minors on any of our social media accounts.
- ~ Jennifer Strothers shared her desire to start a new Sunday school class called: G.I.F.T. Growing In Faith Together This class will be opened for anyone male or female, young or old. Everyone was excited and supportive of this new venture. (There was a motion to start this new class, Andy Breeding seconded it and it was passed.) The class will start on Sunday, September 1st at 9:30am, starting with the book Crazy Love by Francis Chan.
  - Jennifer also brought up the fact that she would like to start a Crafting Ministry.

#### **United Methodist Men:** (Dallas Vanlear reported)

- ~ The UMM had Work Nights on June 18th and July 24th, wherein they trimmed the shrubs, pulled weeds, mulched and completed painting on the parsonage porch. This summer the UMM have also helped with Vacation Bible School props, scenery and staging; and the VBS picnic.
  - On August 20th, the UMM will have another Summer Work Night at 6:00ppm
  - On September 17th, the UMM will have their next meeting starting at 6:30pm

- ~ Pastor Mike and Pastor Susan have arrived safely to New Hope UMC; they have felt welcomed by us and they are getting settled into their new home.
- ~ It was reported that we will now turn our focus back to finalizing our Child & Adult Abuse Program. Starting with communicating to everyone about the program and what is required of us, then we will move to getting training and background checks.

#### **Membership:** (Karen Whitmer reported)

#### As of July 25, 2019:

- 5 members have passed away this year
- 1 child was baptized
- 1 person went through confirmation and membership by profession of faith
- 3 members transferred to New Hope UMC

#### **Lay Leader:** (Dale Rankin reported)

- ~ In the Order of Service on Sunday Morning, the Children's Message will move back to being right after the Welcome & Announcements.
- ~ We want to encourage everyone to use the prayer request slips (located in the pews) whenever there is a prayer request. This allows us to be able to have a record of the prayer request and to ensure that everyone can hear and is aware of the prayer need.

### **Communications:** (Cindy Sheets reported)

- ~ There was discussion about the need to look into upgrading our spoty church wifi and to clean up the computer/internet wires and cords under the table in the church office. There was also discussion about getting quotes on setting up internet boosters throughout the church, so that there could possibly be wifi throughout the entire church building. Cindy Sheets made a motion to get quotes from at least 3 different computer companies, to see how much they will charge and how they can help us. Teresa Barr seconded it and it was passed.
- ~ There was discussion that there are still some problems with the copier when doing 2-sided copies. Shenandoah Valley Office Equipment will be called to try to take care of this problem.
- ~ There was discussion about the continuing effort to get the church phone back up and running, and to reinstall a landline in the parsonage for Pastor MIke.

#### **Pastor Report:** (Pastor Mike)

- ~ Pastor Mike reported that on Saturday, November 2nd, we will have our Charge Conference at Verona UMC from 12pm-3pm. This year's Charge Conference will be held with several other of our neighboring UM churches and will include lunch, the conference and a training session. The annual ministry reports from the chairs of the committees will need to be uploaded to the EVC by October 23rd.
- ~ It was reported that Wednesday Night Dinners will restart after Labor Day.
- ~ There will be a Partners in Ministry Retreat on August 24th at Manor Memorial in New Market from 9pm-4pm. Pastor Mike and Alicia Copeland will attend the retreat as representatives of New Hope UMC.
- ~ Pastor Mike then took time to thank everyone for their help, their mission work and their lay leadership in our church and throughout our communities.

#### **New Business:**

~ It was reported that Costco has a 5-set Panasonic phones for \$100, that will be used throughout the church and they will be paid for by an anonymous church member. Teresa made a motion to buy the phones, Dallas seconded it and it was passed.

The meeting was closed with prayer by Pastor Mike.

## **August is National Dental Implant Month!**

Missing teeth can be harmful to your mental health, causing you to feel self-conscious when smiling and even when talking. Dental implants have, for a long time, been an excellent option for replacing missing teeth and improving the overall appearance of smiles. Many dentists have years of experience in providing this essential

The majority of people with missing teeth do not realize the many options that are available to help replace these missing teeth. There are also a lot of people who consider the use of dental implants to be too expensive, without knowing that affordable options are available. These are the facts that have caused the American Academy of Implant Dentistry to make August the month of Dental Implant Awareness. Simply too many people have been misinformed on tooth replacement protocols, which makes it essential for dentists and other members of the association to take part in this awareness month and spread the good news – that tooth replacement options are readily available and can be more affordable than most people think.

Many options are presented for the replacement of missing teeth in modern day dentistry. No longer does a person have to walk around with missing teeth, too afraid to smile or open their mouth to talk. The options presented in the latest dentistry facilities can provide fast and effective replacement of those teeth that had to be extracted or lost due to cavities, infection or other potential issues.

Standard dental implants are the most common option provided to patients when they wish to restore their smile and only have one tooth missing. This is also an appropriate when option when more than one tooth is missing, but not next to each other. At the moment, it is estimated that over 3 million individuals who live in the United States alone already have dental implants and are enjoying the benefits of a more confident smile offered by these solutions. Approximately half a million new patients also obtain dental implants every year, which means the use of these restorative solutions is growing rather rapidly.


