Happy Surprises

Unexpected events - a patch of ice on an otherwise clear roadway - a blown-out tire on the way to school- a budget-blowing expense on a broken-down household appliance - are so much a part of the ordinary fabric of life as to be regarded "common to man."

What to do about the unexpected is a frequent, but often tabled, conversation. We are trained to practice "defensive driving." We are told to "expect the unexpected." "Safety first" is the motto of the workplace because "what can happen will happen." Yet, in spite of our best efforts, we know that unexpected events inevitably come our way. So, we cover ourselves with insurance policies to handle




nearly any eventuality. While these provide some measure of relief, they can never provide the peace required by the human heart.

But, there is a God who rises far above the temporal concerns of life - a God whose infinite power and resources reach far beyond "all that we ask or think" (*Eph. 3:20*). Solomon rightly prescribes trust in Him as the key to handling life successfully. He says, "Trust in the LORD with all your heart and do not lean on your own understanding" (*Prov. 3:5*). Similarly, the apostle Paul directs God's children to practice trustful prayer, saying, "Be anxious for nothing, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all comprehension, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus" (*Ph. 4:6–7*).

Beyond the ordinary circumstances of life, there are several events for which we should practice anticipatory preparation. Briefly stated, we should expect that we will #1. suffer in some way for the cause of Christ (*Jn.* 15:18-20; 2 Tim. 3:12; 1 Pet. 4:1-5); #2. experience the second coming of the Lord Jesus (*Acts* 1:11; 1 Th. 5:2; 2 Pet. 3:10); and #3. if the Lord should tarry in His return, face the portals of death (*Gen.* 3:19; Rm. 5:12; Hb. 9:27). With God as a trusted-partner, these events can become happy surprises (*Mt.* 5:10-12; 1 Pet. 1:3-9; Rev. 14:13).

The following are the minutes from the JANUARY meeting of the Church Council. The minutes are available for you to help the entire church family Stay In The Know about how this group is caring for New Hope UMC!

Church Council Meeting Minutes - January 30, 2020

Present: Pastor Mike, Samantha Brensinger, Robin Craun, Kevin Armstrong, Andy Breeding, Wanda Harding, Teresa Barr, Bruce Rogers, Jennifer Strother, and Dallas VanLear.

The meeting was called to order at 6:30 pm by Dallas VanLear, chairman, who led devotions from Matthew 7: 24-27 and reading on "When the Storms Come"

Dallas distributed a signup sheet for devotions for 2020.

Minutes were reviewed with correction on page 3 under communications, Jeff Hite should be Jeff Hitt. Minutes were approved with correction noted as presented.

Finance & Treasurer Report: (Kevin Armstrong reported)

- ~ Completed 2019 with \$173,684 budget from \$185,586 proposed (6.4% below budget)
- ~ Beginning 2020 received S15,243 toward \$189,608 budgeted. Teresa asked what portion Bethany UMC was paying New Hope with regards to parsonage expense. Bethany is paying ½ fuel bill.
- ~ Kevin explained the application was submitted to Virginia Developmental Corporation with regards for loan to pay off line of credit at lower interest rate. VDC does not give small loans and referred to the Credit Union. Their rate for 13,900 currently owed with 4.75% for 24 months at payment of \$609 per month or 5.5% for 36 months with payment of \$420 per month. Currently the line of credit is 6% with an average interest of \$74. After discussion it was felt leaving line credit as is. Kevin made motion to pay \$500 toward line credit (to include whatever interested incurred) and seconded by Samantha. Discussion if designated donation was made would that be included in \$500 payment. Kevin amended motion to payment of \$500 be made monthly (including interest) and any designated donation be in addition (example \$500 payment plus received donation of \$25 making payment \$525 for that month). Motion seconded by Robin Craun. Motion passed.

Trustees: (Teresa Barr reported)

- ~ Teresa reviewed highlights of projects completed by Trustees in 2019 including rail for grand piano to be moved easily in sanctuary, new lights in parking lot, electric outlets in multipurpose room (old library), flat roof, ceiling in stairwell, parsonage preparation for new pastor, counting room, gas line on roof, blocked drain pipe, history room cleaned, floors cleaned, door knobs replaced, etc. Contracts have been renewed for lawn care and snow removal.
- ~ Announced plans for the church clean up date on February 22nd at 9:30am. Volunteers needed to help cleaning and removing items no longer used. More details will be announced in the church bulletin and newsletter.

Worship: (Pastor Mike reported)

~ Pastor Mike reported on obtaining chairperson. Worship Committee meeting scheduled for March 10th at 6:30pm to plan Easter Services.

Nurture/Spiritual Development: (Samantha Brensinger reported)

- ~ Souper Bowl of Caring is Sunday following worship with soup and sandwich lunch with donations to Verona Food Pantry (canned goods, cash).
- ~ Parents Night Out is Friday, February 14th from 6pm to 8pm
- ~ Wednesday night meals will resume beginning April 1st at 6pm (first and third Wednesdays for April and May)

Evangelism Ministry: (Vacant - Please see Pastor Mike if you are interested in taking on this ministry.)

~ Pastor Mike person will initially focus on follow-up of visitors.

United Methodist Men: (Dallas VanLear reported)

~ Met on January 21st (no power at church so met at home of Kenny Fretwell) with 5 present. Assumed will serve pancakes for Fat Tuesday on February 25th (5:30pm- 7:00pm) and Sunrise breakfast (April 12th at 7am). Next meeting February 18th to make plans for these meals.

United Methodist Women: (Wanda Harding reported)

Do you remember the story of Abraham and Sarah? New Hope Charge Conference 2019 Administrative & Communications Report

During the past year, we have continued to work to move New Hope UMC forward, to expand our communications within our congregation and community.

Visual & Audio Communications

We continue to create PowerPoint videos every week, to announce and remind the congregation of weekly and monthly upcoming events, activities and meetings. These videos are shown before Worship service each Sunday morning in the Sanctuary and they are also displayed in the Narthex. We have found new ways to utilize our sound system in our social hall and look forward to utilizing that feature further to enhance our upcoming events.

We make DVD copies of our past sermons and special worship services upon request. And we continue to move closer to getting our new church's website up and running; where we will post past sermons online for people to watch and share with others who are not able to get to our church on Sunday mornings.

Church Bulletins and Newsletter

We have continued our weekly Sunday Morning Worship bulletins with the order of service, acknowledgment of servers and special event announcements. When necessary we produce a bulletin with the order of services for any special services or events that we host. We also continue to make available children's bulletins, so that our young people can be stimulated with the word of God through coloring pages, puzzles and word games.

Our monthly church newsletter, called The Hilltopper, continues to be produced every month. This newsletter highlights all of our upcoming events, reviews the past month's activities with pictures and stats, highlights church business, provides inspirational articles, Christian jokes, a kid's corner with a biblically-themed coloring page *and much more!* It is available to folks in both an online format and also in a printed version. We also mail them out to people upon request.

Upcoming Events

At the beginning of each month, we produce and distribute an *Upcoming Events* flyer, to help our church family stay up-to-date on all of our church's activities, meetings and events that are coming up each month. Our church family members can attach this flyer to their refrigerators, so that they are never too far away from knowing what is going on at our church each day of the week.

Social Media

During this past year, we have also stepped up our social media presence on facebook, (adding approximately 200 followers in the last year and a half), so that we can stay connected with people when we have special outreach events within our community. We also utilize facebook to help remind our congregation of upcoming meetings and activities happening at our church. Whenever we have a special event or special presentation, we post pictures and/or videos of these events on our facebook page, so that people can relive the experience. Or for those who aren't able to attend the event, they can see everything that is happening here at New Hope UMC.

Currently, we are in the very beginning stages of developing a strong presence on Instagram. We feel as though our outreach through Instagram may be a good way to stay connected with our youth and young adults, as they have tended to gravitate towards this particular social media forum.

Website

I have worked over the past year to rebuild our new church website from scratch. Our goal is to go live with our new website by the early part of November 2019. Our new website will be a place for people to go, so that they can learn about New Hope UMC at-a-glance. They can learn about who we are, our history, what we do, and they can get a good sense of how mission-oriented we are here at New Hope UMC.

Equipping Vital Congregations

This year, I continue to input the requested information about our weekly attendance, bible study attendance, Sunday school attendance, weekly tithing and other information into the EVC database, so that we can have a more accurate account of our church's vitality and growth.

Church Directory





Many Hands Make Light Work!

From Pastor Mike's Desk

February 2020



I just can't get that image out of my mind.

A few weeks ago, I was standing in the checkout line at Wal-Mart. Things were moving slowly, and I was getting somewhat impatient. Then I noticed a child in the seat of the shopping cart in front of me.

He was a cute little boy and looked to be about 18 months old. Like many toddlers his age who are dragged along on shopping trips with their parents, he was restless and wanted out

of his seat. So, he squirmed a little bit and expressed his displeasure to his mother.

He didn't give out a loud scream. It was more a cry of frustration from a child who was bored, hungry, or tired. I empathized with his mom and remembered similar times with my own children. I would try to distract Michelle or Rachel with a box of animal crackers. Sometimes I brought along a small toy for them to hold during situations just like these.

The child's frustration was growing. His mom mostly ignored him until she'd had enough and said to the child, "You've done it now. I'm going to get the belt."

The child was not old enough to talk but he obviously knew what those words meant, and his anxiety grew. Threatened with a spanking, his behavior worsened. And as things escalated, his mom kept repeating, "I'm going to get the belt."

I could understand the mother's frustration, but the child was just being a normal toddler who could not tell his mom exactly what he wanted or how he was feeling. How could she possibly hope to calm down this child by threatening him with a belt.

Another woman with the child and mother happened to his Grandma. At one point the mom said to the child, "Grandma's going out to the car to get the belt." I hoped that Grandma would step in and be the voice of reason and reassure the child but instead Grandma chimed in, "That's right. I'm going to get the belt."

And on and on this went until they left the store. As they rolled their cart out into the parking lot, I wondered if a beating with a belt was in that boy's immediate future. I'd like to believe that the "belt" that awaited the child was nothing more than hollow words spoken by a frustrated and overburdened mother. I will never know for certain.

When a child becomes accustomed to hearing harsh words rather than feeling love, when threats become a substitute for human care and concern, that child grows up missing something important in his or her life. What's missing is the stability of a life grounded in love.

There are times when a parent must be firm with a child and occasions when discipline must be handed out. Parenting is a tough job, but threats disguised as discipline only serve to frighten a child when loving reassurance is needed.

I believe that is the way God chooses to be in relationship with us. My relationship with Jesus Christ is a "Blessed Assurance." I hope that young boy will grow to experience that assurance in his life as well.
