Church Council Meeting Minutes - June 22, 2023

Present: Kevin Armstrong, Becky Breeding, Bianca Brensinger, Alicia Copeland, Robin Craun, Cindy Deavers, Phylis Fretwell, Wanda Harding, Beth Howdyshell, Linda Howdyshell, Corey Johnson, Bill Lalla, Pastor Mike, Bruce Rogers, Cindy Sheets, Dallas VanLear, and Karen Whitmer.

The meeting was called to order by chairperson Dallas Van Lear. And Bianca Brensinger read a devotion from Genesis 1:27-28 and prayed.

There was a correction to the May 2023 meeting minutes: David Gibbs is the attorney that is working for the disaffiliation process.

Finance Report: (Kevin Armstrong reported)

- Next Finance Committee meeting is August 10th at 6pm. Reminder that the chair of every committee is also a member of the Finance Committee and should make an effort to be involved in these finance meetings too.
- So far, June looks bleak, as we have only taken in \$6,373 as of today in tithings and offerings; and we need \$10,000 each month to pay the church staff.
- Kevin recommended that we do not pay any apportionments for June to the District.
- Kevin stated that in the summer there is always a financial dip, but it is stiffer this year.

Treasurer: (Cindy Deavers reported)

- On the current balance sheet: Under payables to vendors this is our property and liability insurance, it is due on July 3rd, but has not been paid as of yet. It's \$6,500, that's up \$500 from last year. And the worker's comp insurance is actually down slightly from last year. We budgeted for \$7,000, and we will be over in total \$433 more than what we budgeted for our insurance.
- The monthly bills for June have been paid for.
- The apportionment payment that you see on the current budget is for May's apportionments.

Finance Secretary: (Robin Craun reported)

- Becky Breeding will be taking over Robin's position as Finance Secretary. Starting in August, Becky and Robin will be transitioning in and out of this role. They will work together to make it as smooth of a transition as possible for everyone.
- Pastor Mike made a motion to nominate Becky Breeding as Assistant Finance Secretary for now and to also make her a member of the Finance Committee and the Church Council. Kevin seconded it and the motion was passed by all.

Trustees: (Corey Johnson reported)

- There was no meeting in June.
- They are still "chasing propane tanks" because at our price point they go fast when they come up for sale.

Pastor Mike: (Pastor Mike reported)

- On Sunday, July 9th, Mike will give a presentation on his mission trip to Cuba. We will also have a light lunch at this time. Also on Sunday, July 9th, we will hold a "Baby Shower" for our nursery. We will be asking for donations of needed nursery items, along with monetary donations. We are anticipating at last 3 new babies coming into our church family very soon, along with a number of new toddlers who have been joining us on Sunday mornings.
- The first class on the summer bible study was held last Tuesday with 15 people participating.

Worship Committee (Pastor Mike reported)

- On July 10th, the Worship Committee will meet again.
- We are still in need of a Hospitality Chairperson.

Spiritual Nurture: (report from Samantha Brensinger)

- We have leaders established for all the VBS stations, but still need several volunteers.
- We have scheduled the Old School Burgers food truck to be here on Monday, July 24th, the first day of VBS, to serve dinner. We are going to advertise to the community to also come and buy dinner off the truck. This will help pay for our costs for dinner of VBS kids and volunteers.
- There is a poster in the Narthex with a place for monetary donations, to help pay for supplies, decorations and the dinners to be served each night of VBS. There is alot to still purchase, so any donations would be appreciated.
- We will be handing out school supplies again this year on the Sunday after VBS, we will be
 posting what kind of supplies that we need soon. Green Valley Book Fair will be having a
 school supply sale soon and could be a great opportunity to get those supplies for VBS
 Sunday.

UM Men and UM Women: (Bill Lalla / Wanda Harding reported)

No meetings during the summer.

Staff Parish Relations Committee: (Pastor Mike reported)

- Met in June, and the annual evaluation was turned into the District office.

Membership: (Karen Whitmer reported)

- The membership list for the District Superintendent is completed.
- There are 255 names on the list with addresses that were available from various sources.
- At this point, 17 names have been eliminated from the original list because no address could be found.
- 6 names were those of deceased persons.
- 11 names were removed by letter of transfer.
- 13 names were listed as those who voluntarily withdrew their membership.
- These names will be submitted to the Charge Conference for approval and formal removal of their membership status.
- Karen would like to thank Pastor Mike, Wanda Harding and all the church family members who helped her gather information.

Lay Leader: (Cindy Deavers reported)

- Cindy stated that it was a privilege to be able to serve as Lay Leader. And that she plans to get more involved as our Lay Leader in the coming months.

Youth: (Bianca Brensinger reported)

- The Sight and Sound trip was a success with 23 people enjoying the trip. We were able to get a gift card for the unsold tickets, which some of it was used to allow all the kids and youth to get something from the gift shop. There was positive feedback and much interest in doing the trip again next year to see Daniel.

Disaffiliation Business:

- Dallas will send the District Superintendent the needed information, i.e, trustees info, property deeds, etc., by the end of next week, so that they can move forward.
- David Gibbs is our out-of-state attorney and Jonathon Bailie is our in-state attorney. We do not know a cost for the attorneys. So far the church has not paid anything out of pocket.
- The District Conference attorney's fees are \$300 per hour.
- October 7th is the last call for disaffiliation in our conference. Churches will need to have a
 vote at least a month before this date.
- We need copies of the deeds church property, cemetery deed, deed to the parking lot across the street from the church, and other information.
- The District Superintendent will write up the communications about the vote that will go out in letter form to the members of the church.
- The District Superintendent will run the meeting for a vote. He will have a membership list, check names off, give people a ballot, they will go vote and when everyone who is eligible has voted, then the votes will be counted and we will know the same day what the results are.
- We need 66.67% of the vote to disaffiliate.
- We may not know the full amount that we would owe the District at the time of the vote.
- If we would vote to disaffiliate and do not pay the District their outstanding amount before the end of the year, then we will stay with the United Methodist.
- The church council can still vote to pause the disaffiliation process at any time before the vote.

New Business:

- Cindy Deavers stated that under the current Rules and Regulations of the Cemetery Fund, that the money in that account can not be used to pay for mowing of the cemetery.
 That the money in the Cemetery Fund can only be used for projects in the cemetery.
- The Rules and Regulations of the Cemetery Fund are dated April 23, 2015, but there was some discussion as to whether they had been revised since then.
- Corey Johnson, as chairperson of the Trustees; Cindy Deavers, as Lay Leader; Teresa Barr, as Cemetery Custodian and one other person as assistant Cemetery Custodian make up the Cemetery Committee.
- The Cemetery Fund money is in CDs with a low earning interest rate. The Cemetery Fund Rules and Regulations state that the principal amount is not to be used at all. The interest has never been moved out of the Cemetery Fund.
- There was discussion about whether or not we could use that interest money to help pay for maintenance, which mowing the grass may or may not be covered under that definition.
- It was recommended that the Cemetery Fund Policy be revised for better clarity within the Cemetery Committee, and then they will bring those recommendations to the Trustees and then to the Church Council.
- Karen made a motion for the Cemetery Committee to be reorganized, reconvene and to revisit the details on using the interest in the Cemetery Fund to help pay for mowing and to present their decisions to the Trustees. Bill Lalla seconded it and it was passed by all.

Dallas thanked us all for our time to move the church and the community forward. And stated his appreciation for all we do on behalf of the entire church. Pastor Mike prayed and the meeting ended at 7:23pm.



Annual Conference Report

Last Saturday we concluded the 241st annual conference of the United Methodist Church which was held in Roanoke. Besides being a business meeting, this was a spiritual experience for the over 2,000 attendees representing every church in The Virginia Conference.

By necessity, a portion of this gathering was about conducting the business of the church. I will skip over these figures as all of these facts and figures are in the book of reports, which is on the conference website at VAUMC.org.

One particular statistic that grabbed me was that the UMC is actively involved in global, as well as local missions. Over 14,000 kits of all kinds (flood buckets, first aid, hygiene, etc.) were collected with over 3,200 coming from our district alone. These will be supporting missionaries in over 60 countries worldwide. Also, as of June 1st, over \$27 million dollars has been raised for Ukraine alone for food, clothing, shelter, medicine, and refugee resettlement.

To me, one of the resounding themes of our conference is that every lay person is also a minister. The responsibility of greeting new attendees, sharing our stories, welcoming others to come worship with us and helping others; either emotionally, spiritually, or with physical needs, is the job of every one of us. A question posed to every congregation. "When a new person visits, does everyone whisper "I wonder who that is?" or do we make it a point to greet them?

A highlight of our event was a celebration called "The Ordering of Ministry". This was the consecration of those willing and able to move into positions of spiritual leadership. In total, 47 people were ordained either as lay supply, deacons, local pastors, provisional elders, or full elders.

Another special time occurred one morning when there was a meeting of just the laity of each church (sorry, no preachers allowed). We discussed what was going on where we have been planted, challenges we faced, opportunities for lay ministry, and our hopes for the future.

If you only ever decide to listen to one message other than Pastor Mike's, I encourage you to listen to the opening address and message of Bishop Sue. It was not at all political, just spiritual, I can promise that after hearing it, you will want to share it. Again, it's on the conference website VAUMC.org (forward to 1 hour 3 min, 1:03), it will be a valuable 15 minutes.

As a matter of course, the topic of disaffiliation did arise at various times. The estimate is that by the October deadline about 9.3% of churches will have chosen to leave the Virginia Conference. The Bishop graciously had prayer for them, thanking them for their years of service and wishing them well in the future.

Another way to look at this statistic however is that over 90% of churches will have chosen to stay, and the projection is that after October we will have over 900 churches and more than 95,000 United Methodists in the Virginia Conference.

Considering the large number of churches remaining; 47 people of faith dedicating themselves to be UMC church leaders; the numerous mission opportunities the UMC is involved in; and the report of brand new start up congregations in Northern VA, I believe a bright future lies ahead for the United Methodist Church to carry out Christ's work in this World.



I look upon the world with a greater view. My branches reach to heaven, my home.


Through the year I am ever-changing, growing and nurturing new life.


My leaves may wither and fall.

And my seeds of the Good News will fall and be carried on the wind and travel to the places of the world that I cannot see, from where I stand.


So go and plant a seed!
