Christians & Halloween

It's not uncommon for people to struggle with whether to celebrate Halloween. Some see it as a dark day full of evil influence while others deem it a harmless time for fun costumes and candy. This answer from the **Billy Graham Evangelistic Association** may offer some guidance on Halloween and even give you creative ideas for using the holiday to share Christ:

Q: I have mixed feelings about how our family should be involved in Halloween. What should I do?

A: People come to different conclusions about celebrating Halloween, particularly if they have young children or grandchildren to consider.

For some people, this holiday is a time for dress-up and candy; it is an opportunity for fun. Others express concern for their children's safety or for the emphasis that is often made on violence or horror at this time of year. Those who are interested in the right or wrong of the celebration may look at the holiday's origin in the occult and believe it should not be celebrated at all; they are aware that some groups celebrate Halloween as a tribute to Satan.

On the other hand, others recognize that Halloween, the eve of "All Saints' Day" (November 1), is also associated with Martin Luther and the Reformation. They celebrate



the religious freedoms won at that time in history. Since each of these perspectives contain truth, it is difficult to know how to respond.

We encourage each family to develop their own approach to Halloween based on their own convictions and the options for celebration available to them. The responsibility to make this decision rests on the adults in the family, not the children. The peer pressure on children is far too great for them to be objective. Certainly, providing a safe, fun environment must be a priority.

Some parents adapt the traditional Halloween practices, while others develop totally different alternatives. These alternatives may include fall festival parties where children are encouraged to dress in a particular theme such as positive cartoon or book characters, famous historical characters, or Bible heroes.

Carrying out that theme with simple acting can be fun and an opportunity for teaching values. Children will always be attracted to costumes and treats; finding positive ways to enjoy these pleasures is the primary challenge for caring adults.

If you decide to make a major change in the way your family celebrates Halloween, you may not need to do all the work yourself. We would encourage you to contact churches in your area to determine what activities are being planned. Rather than separate completely from the night's activities, some Christians give Gospel tracts along with treats to children who come to their homes and make Halloween an opportunity to witness for Christ.



New Hope Charge Conference 2018 Administrative Report

During the last seven months that I have been New Hope UMC's Church Administrator, we have worked to move New Hope UMC forward to expand our visual communications within our congregation, to reach our church family where they are. The audio/visual system has been completed and we continue to explore ways that we can utilize this new system. We create a PowerPoint video that is presented before our Worship services each Sunday in order to help visually communicate our upcoming activities, meetings and events to our congregates as they come in and prepare for Sunday Worship Services. Each week we make DVD copies of our past sermons, that can be taken to those who are unable to attend our Sunday morning services, due to the fact that they are either homebound or if they are in assisted living homes.

We have continued our weekly Sunday bulletins, with an updated look. When necessary we produce a bulletin with the Order of Services for any special services or events that we host. We also continue to make available children's bulletins, so that our young people can be stimulated with the word of God through coloring pages, puzzles and word games. And we continue to produce our monthly church newsletter, called The Hilltopper, that was established in March 1977. This newsletter highlights all of our upcoming events, reviews the past month's activities, highlights church business, provides inspirational articles, Christian jokes, a kid's corner with a biblically-themed coloring page and much more!

At the beginning of each month, we produce and distribute an *Upcoming Events* flyer, to help our church family stay up-to-date on all of our church's activities, meetings and events that are coming up each month. Our church family members can attach this flyer to their refrigerators, so that they are never too far away from knowing what is going on at our church each day of the week.

We have also stepped up our social media presence on facebook. We have updated our church's facebook page and we work to add posts about upcoming church events and reminders about meetings, etc. We also try to add positive and uplifting pictures, scriptures and sayings from time-to-time to share with our New Hope UMC community. Whenever we have a special event or special presentation, we post pictures and videos of these events on our facebook page, so that people can relive the experience. Or for those who aren't able to attend the event, they can see everything that is happening here at New Hope UMC. And at least once a month we do a #FlashbackFriday picture, when we add a post with a picture from our History Room collection, to give people a chance to reminisce on some of our church family in their younger days, or to see pictures and information of some of our church artifacts.

I have worked over the past few months to rebuild our new church website from scratch. Our goal is to go live with our new website in the month of October. Our new website will be a place for people to go, so that they can learn about New Hope UMC at-a-glance. They can learn about who we are, what we do, and they can get a good sense of how mission-oriented we are here at New Hope UMC.

I have also worked to update our church's profile information on the Equipping Vital Churches database. I input information about our weekly attendance, bible study attendance, Sunday school attendance, weekly tithing and other information onto the EVC database, so that we can have a more accurate account of our church's vitality. And I am working to update our church's contact information on the www.umc.org/find-a-church website and other online locations, so that we will have accurate, up-to-date information for people when they look up New Hope UMC and search for more information about us online.

New Hope UMC continues to work to improve our administrative, outreach and ministerial efforts, and to reach our goal of meeting people where they are, so that we can share with them the good news of Jesus Christ!

New Hope UMC Missions Report

Many of our missions are included in other reports such as our contributions to the Verona Food Pantry, the Staunton Mission, Weekday Religious Education to name a few.

Working with District Superintendent Tommy Herndon, we installed a new dishwasher in the district parsonage.

During the year, we constructed a ramp for a church member who required it to enter her home. In addition we provided hookups for her washer and dryer at the same level as the main floor of the home.

We have traveled to Tangier Island multiple times over the years and again last October. There we work with the local United Methodist Church to complete lists of chores for residents of the island. While there we participate in their Wednesday Prayer Meeting and work alongside members of the congregation. Once again the first week of October this year we will travel to this mission led by Reverend Sam NeSmith under the auspices of VIM...

We are in the initial planning stages of partnering with Mt. Zion to work with their congregation on items needed to improve their church building.

Locally we deliver communion monthly to persons in the congregation who cannot be present for our communion service. Lay persons deliver consecrated elements.

Our free Wednesday evening church dinner, available to neighbors is delivered to local persons, including the local fire department, who are unable to be at the dinner. Our United Methodist Men deliver meals on the meeting nights as well.

The Real Deal on Electronic Cigarettes

National Healthy Lung Month is observed each October. Lung Cancer is the leading cause of cancer deaths in the United States, and the majority of lung cancers are directly linked to smoking. One of the newest and most controversial topics in regards to lung health and lung cancer is electronic cigarettes.

Electronic cigarettes are known by a variety of names including e-cigarettes, e-cigs, e-hookahs, vape pens and electronic nicotine delivery systems (ENDS). Using an e-cigarette is often referred to as 'vaping'. E-cigarettes come in a multitude of shapes and sizes and most contain a battery, heating element, and container to hold a liquid. Some resemble regular cigarettes or cigars, or even everyday items such as pens. In addition to nicotine, e-cigarettes can be used for marijuana and other drugs.

E-cigarettes produce an aerosol by heating a liquid that usually contains nicotine, flavorings, and other harmful chemicals. Users inhale the aerosol into their lungs. The harmful chemicals in the liquid could include ultrafine particles that can be inhaled deep into the lungs, flavorings such as diacetyl (a chemical linked to lung disease), volatile organic compounds, heavy metals such as nickel, tin and lead, and other cancer-causing chemicals. However it is difficult to know specifically what an e-cigarette contains. Some e-cigarettes marketed as 'zero percent nicotine' have been found to contain nicotine.

Since e-cigarettes are relatively new, medical experts are still determining the long-term health effects. Here is what scientists have determined so far:

- Most e-cigarettes contain nicotine, which has known health risks, especially for pregnant women and children.
- Besides nicotine, e-cigarette aerosol can contain substances that harm the body and cause cancer.
- E-cigarettes can cause unintended injuries from defective battery fires and explosions or toxic acute nicotine exposure from swallowing the e-cigarette liquid.

E-cigarettes are less harmful than regular cigarettes, but that does not mean they are safe. The aerosol from e-cigarettes contains fewer toxic chemicals than the mix of chemicals in regular cigarette smoke. However, e-cigarette aerosol contains many harmful substances and cancer-causing agents.

Just like regular cigarettes, e-cigarettes have an increased risk for youth, young adults and pregnant women because of the effects of nicotine exposure on brain development. Use of e-cigarettes by youth is associated with an increased use of other tobacco products. Currently youth in the United States are more likely to use e-cigarettes than adults, and e-cigs are the most commonly used tobacco product among youth. In 2016, 11.3% of high school students used e-cigarettes. Among e-cigarette users aged 18-24 years of age, 40% had never been regular cigarette smokers.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration have not approved e-cigarettes as a quit smoking aid. The U.S. Preventative Services Task Force has determined that there is insufficient evidence to recommend e-cigarettes for smoking cessation in adults. The potential for adult smokers who are not pregnant to benefit from e-cigarettes as a complete substitute from other tobacco products is still being investigated.

So what is the bottom line for lung health? If you have never smoked or used other tobacco products or e-cigarettes, don't start!

Attendance averaged approximately 50-60/night. An hour before the Wednesday meal, a Bible study was open to all. Many persons helped with set-up, clean-up, and serving of the meal to get the job done efficiently without it becoming too burdensome to any one person. A special offering at the meal in April went to the Camp Overlook Day Camp project.

Special services held on Christmas Eve (2017), Ash Wednesday, Maundy Thursday, and Easter (Sunrise) gave opportunity for additional spiritual nurture beyond worship.

Other events such as the 50's Drive-In, Souper Bowl Lunch on Super Bowl Sunday (donations going to the Verona Food Pantry) and a Hearts Party brought the church family together to work or play, and to get to know each other better.

Covered dish luncheons following worship on the fifth Sundays of the year provided fellowship time. July 30 the annual church picnic was held in the evening. It being Rural Life Sunday, and to the delight of children, there was a tractor present in the parking lot after the morning service for them to (pretend) drive. Homemade ice cream (some hand-cranked by those at the picnic) and butter-churning, another tractor, and special music made for the "days-gone-by" atmosphere and an enjoyable experience.
