From Pastor Mike

My Sunday School class was having its annual Christmas party when I was in the Fourth grade. One boy did not want to go but his mother insisted. As she dropped her son, we could hear her say to him, "Don't ruin Christmas for everyone."

I was familiar with that admonishment – "Don't ruin Christmas for everyone." Usually, it was said when either I or one of my siblings was bored at some Christmas gathering.

Maybe you remember someone saying it to you. Perhaps you have said it to your own children or grandchildren.

Some people put a lot of pressure on themselves (and their families) to have a "perfect" Christmas – whatever that means. I suppose a perfect Christmas for many folks is one where everyone gets that gift he or she wants, all family and friends are together, old grudges and disagreements are gone or set aside, and the Christmas dinner table looks like a picture out of *Martha Stewart Living*.

Notice very little thought is given to Jesus whose birthday is being celebrated.

What do you have left when you take away the packages, the food, the decorations and expectations, and every other thing society says you have to have at Christmas?

You have what John 1:14 tells you: "The Word became Flesh and dwelt among us." The God who became bone of our bone and flesh of our flesh to rescue us from sin and death is what you have.

The culture wants to celebrate the "spirit of Christmas" which is all about happy feelings. But feelings come and go. Our troubles do not take a holiday because the calendar says they should. A celebration focused on happy feelings can be ruined. Pursuing this type of "perfect" Christmas overwhelmingly ends in disappointment.

Christians celebrate the Flesh of Christmas – God in the Flesh who dwelt among us. So, we know nothing can ruin Christmas. Not sticks, not stones, not broken bones. Not drunkenness, nor neglect. Not old grudges, or fresh wounds. Not bad news from doctors, or bosses.

The Lord will not be stopped. Not even the lack of room at the inn could stop Him. Not even the lack of room in our hearts, not the years of our refusal to forgive has stopped Him. God as man – as a baby – has placed Himself into the manger, a feeding trough. And that is appropriate because the Lord has given Himself as food for selfish people who, at times, behave worse than animals.

The Word became Flesh that could be nailed down so that our weak flesh could escape corruption. His light shines from the Cross through the empty tomb to drive away sins like the summer sun burns the fog off.

Don't get me wrong. I am not telling you that you have no reason to be sad. Other people might demand, "It's Christmas, so you can't be upset, you can only be holly and jolly." But we still live this side of Heaven at Christmas. Try to sweep conflict under the rug, and you will trip over it. Our hearts still feel the touch of anger, frustration, and grief.

Yet Jesus is still Immanuel – God's Flesh in our midst. That is the reason even for joy during sadness, life amid death, and hope in times of despair. Still, He forgives those who desire His mercy. Still, He shepherds His flock through death and into life. Until we receive Christ's reward in Paradise, we wait in peace with God. For Christ is our peace, the only stable thing, the only thing that does not age, wither or break in all of Creation, and nothing can ruin that – therefore, nothing can ruin Christmas. Not even a little boy who doesn't want to go to his Sunday School Christmas party.

The Word became Flesh. We have a Savior. There lies our only chance at perfection. Thanks

be to God.

Church Council Meeting Minutes - December 1, 2022

Present: Bianca Brensinger, Samantha Brensinger, Kevin Armstrong, Alicia Copeland, Pastor Mike, Wanda Harding, Jennifer Strother, Dallas VanLear, Karen Whitmer, Cindy Deavers, Robin Craun, and Bruce Rogers.

The meeting was called to order by chairperson, Dallas VanLear. Wanda Harding shared devotions from James 1:17 and Romans 12:6 on good and perfect gifts.

The minutes from October meeting were accepted as distributed with two corrections (page 1 apportionments for 2022 and page 2 charge conference was held at Randolph Macon Academy.

Dallas, chairperson, noted all are welcome at church council meetings; however respect is to be shown to the person speaking and to avoid side comments that are not pertinent to the agenda. Also reminder only those who are chairpersons of committees have voting privileges.

Finance Report (Kevin Armstrong reported)

92% of year completed; 77% of budget received; 15% behind (about \$7200 short in paying conference apportionments. Will pay apportionments as planned for November/December and if additional funds are received will pay toward conference apportionments. Will fund mission giving of \$4016 for WRE, Food Bank, and District Mission asking, etc as budgeted).

Two appeals have been made to our congregation with budget needs.

Received \$500 designated for landscaping in middle circle in cemetery. Referred to Trustees.

Financial Secretary (Robin Craun reported)

Giving envelopes for 2023 are available in the Narthex. If you can help with delivery of these to anyone who is not present regularly, it would be appreciated.

Pastor's Report (Pastor Mike reported)

Addition to the Nomination's Report is Jim Strother as Trustee.

Complete Officers 2023 and Budget 2023 will be available at end of December.

Sometimes those that have someone missing in a chair at the table or around the tree don't feel the spirit of Christmas. Sometimes those who have lost a job, less hours at work, or can't make ends meet don't feel the spirit of Christmas. Sometimes those dealing with disrespectful people day in and day out don't feel the spirit of Christmas. And sometimes the complete lack of wanting to do anything, but stay in bed for those with depression don't feel the spirit of Christmas.

Mary and Joseph were thankful that they at least had a place to lie down. It was warm, and there was plenty of straw to lay on.


