Back To School

It seems like it was yesterday when you could hear the last school bell ring letting you know that summer had officially begun. You trade in your backpacks full of books for suitcases full of swimsuits and sunglasses. The sun's been out and the weather has been hot, even if it was for a short while. VBS and summer vacations have come and gone. But we've reached the time of year where it starts getting darker earlier, the leaves will start changing colors and the heat will turn into cool, crisp air. And all this can only mean one thing: school is back in session. Many of the young people are already back in classes, while some will start in the coming weeks. Moms and dads may be done with school, but the thought of sending a child off to their first day of middle school, high school, or even college can be very frightening. Schools today are a battleground of sins and temptations. Will they remember everything we've taught them about friends, relationships,

drinking, etc.?

Message to the kids/teens: This is a new year. A time to start fresh and start over. It's easy to get sucked into all the temptations that can be found on a college or high school campus. Satan is prowling like a lion ready to devour you (1 Peter 5:8). But remember who you are. Remember that you wear the name of Christ proudly. Paul wrote in 1 Cor. 11:1 to "imitate me, just as I also imitate Christ." Remember that our attitude and our personality should always imitate Christ's attitude. There will be times where it will be hard to do the right thing and you'll find yourselves between a rock and a hard place, but just



remember "if God is for us, who can be against us?" (Rom. 8:31). Remember that you have a family of Christians that are here for you whenever you need them. Don't be afraid to admit you need help.

Message to the parents: It's impossible to know everything that goes on while your child is at school. But the best thing you can do is give them a daily reminder of the Lord they serve. Pray with your children each morning before school. Read scriptures with them about temptations and how to overcome them. Write a scripture on a piece of paper or a napkin and put it in their lunch. If their mind is constantly on the Lord, guess who will be on their mind when a problem arises.

Message to the congregation: It is not just the parent's responsibility to raise these children in the "training and admonition of the Lord" (Eph. 6:4). As a flock of God's people we are to look after each other. We are to all set an example in "word, in conduct, in love, in spirit, in faith, in purity" (1 Tim. 4:12). Let us all take the responsibility to make sure that everyone continues to grow spiritually. It takes a village to raise a child. Whether you want to admit it or not, every child in this congregation is your own. Remember what it was like to be young? Do whatever you can to help these students succeed.

The following are the minutes from the August meeting of the Church Council. They are available for you to help the entire church congregation <u>Stay In The Know</u> about what and how this group are caring for the people and the church building of New Hope UMC - in the past, the present and into the future!

The New Hope United Methodist Church Council met on Thursday, August 23, 2018 with 15 members present. Sam Arnold, Chairman, called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. and opened the meeting with devotions.

Those members present: Sam Arnold, Chairman, Debbie Arnold, Recording Secretary, Kevin Armstrong, Robin Craun, Wanda Harding, Larry Hinebaugh, Pastor Shin Hong, Kim Maugans, John Morse, Dale Rankin, Bruce Rogers, Cindy Sheets, Dallas VanLear, JoEtta Walker. Guests were Alicia Copeland and Nadine Hinebaugh.

Minutes of the July 12, 2018 meeting were approved as submitted.

<u>Finance Committee</u>: Kevin Armstrong, Chairman

1) The 2019 church budget of \$185,786 was presented and approved. The detailed budget is part of these recorded minutes.

<u>Treasurer's Report</u>: Cindy Deavers was absent, Treasurer's Report was submitted by Kevin Armstrong.

1) Revenue has been positive. We are able to meet our bills and payments in a timely manner. The Treasurer's Report statement is a part of these recorded minutes.

<u>Trustees</u>: Larry Hinebaugh, Chairman, presented the Trustees Report.

- 1) New LED lights were installed in the hanging light fixtures in the church sanctuary.
- 2) Proposal to replace heat/AC systems in the Social Hall and old Sunday school rooms was presented and approved by the Council. The project is scheduled to begin September 25 and will take eight to ten business days. Bids were obtained from Boyers and ZEH. Boyers was the lowest bid with an estimated cost of \$30,700.00. Larry reported the boiler is working, but the hot water lines are leaking and cannot be replaced without major expense. The Trustees requested a total budget of \$40,000.00 from the church line of credit. The additional \$9,300.00 will be used to install additional insulation in the parsonage and old Sunday school building. Boyers has requested half of total before start date. A motion was made and a second received. The Council made a unanimous vote in favor of the project and amount to be borrowed.

- 3) A backflow water treatment system has been installed to remove particles from our water supply for the church and parsonage.
- 4) The floors in the Social Hall/Kitchen area were professionally cleaned.

Worship Ministry: No report presented.

<u>Nurture/Spiritual Development Ministry</u>: JoEtta Walker, Chairperson

1) JoEtta reported the upcoming activities for the months ahead. The activities are posted on the calendar near the church bulletin board for everyone to see. Major events for September: (Please see our Calendar of Events page.)

- 1) Dale reported that new Communion Kits were ordered and received.
- 2) New material has been ordered for the Wednesday Bible Study Class. The topic is "Contagious Christian". The 6 week class will begin Wednesday, September 5 @ 5:00 p.m.

Missions/Outreach Ministry: John Morse

- 1) There are 6 people signed up for the upcoming mission ministry. They will go to Tangier Island, VA, October 1-6. Kim Maugans is planning to go before the scheduled trip to inquire about what project(s) they will work on during the mission trip. Kim will determine what materials will be needed.
- 2) Mt. Zion UMC in Mt. Solon is in need of new paint and "sprucing" up of the grounds. Al Tuten is the serving minister and John and Kim will be in touch with him about how we can help them as a mission project.

Hodgkin's Lymphoma

September is Blood Cancer/Leukemia and Lymphoma Awareness Month. One cancer that falls under this category is Hodgkin's Lymphoma (HL). This is a cancer that starts in the white blood cells called lymphocytes, and the most common sites are in the neck, chest, and under the arms. The American Cancer Society estimated that there would be about 8,500 new cases of HL in 2018, and it is identified as one of the most curable forms of cancer.

There are two main types of HL which are Classic HL and Nodular Lymphocyte-Predominant HL. Classic HL is more common and accounts for more than 9 in 10 cases of HL. These cancer cells are called Reed-Sternberg cells, an abnormal type of B lymphocyte. There are four subtypes which fall under Classic HL: 1.) Nodular Sclerosis HL, 2.) Mixed Cellularity HL, 3.) Lymphocyte-rich HL, and 4.) Lymphocyte-depleted HL. Nodular Lymphocyte-Predominant HL is less common and only accounts for about 5 percent of cases. This type is characterized by large cells called popcorn cells (because they look like popcorn) and grows more slowly. This type is also more common in men than women.

Although doctors and researchers do not know for sure what causes Hodgkin's Lymphoma, there are a few risk factors associated with the disease. People who have had the Epstein - Barr virus (often called mono) are at an increased risk of developing HL. However, the chance is still low (about 1 in 1,000), and researchers do not know exactly why this virus is associated with HL. Age and gender are also risk factors. Hodgkin's Lymphoma is more common in early adulthood (especially in a person's 20s) and later in adulthood after age 55. It occurs slightly more in males than in females. Those who have weakened immune systems already due to other causes are also at a higher risk of developing HL. Few of these risk factors can be changed, so it is not possible to prevent most cases of HL at this time. However, eating well, getting regular physical activity, and not smoking can contribute to your overall well-being and may lower your risk for developing many cancers and other diseases.

There are several signs and symptoms that are associated with Hodgkin's Lymphoma. Some who are diagnosed may have one symptom, several, or none depending on when they are diagnosed. These include:

- Having a lump in the neck, under the arm, or in the groin
- B symptoms: fever without infection, drenching night sweats, and weight loss without trying
- Itching, fatigue, loss of appetite, cough, trouble breathing, chest pain

If you have any of these symptoms, it obviously does not guarantee that you have HL, so don't worry! It's always best to consult with your doctor so that the cause can be found and, if needed, treated.

Treatment depends on the exact type of HL and the staging. It could include chemotherapy, radiation, or a combination of both. If the HL is recurrent, immunotherapy or high-dose chemotherapy and stem cell transplant may be options.



This meeting will include a Worship service and Communion. It will be conducted in our Sanctuary followed by light refreshments in the social hall.





Psalm 23

Psalm 23 is one of the more famous psalms written by David the King. This was the same David who took down Goliath with a slingshot and some smooth stones.

David was now King but he was also a musician and liked to write poems and songs. This particular psalm is about God being his Shepherd-King.

Keep in mind that David used to be a shepherd. He remembers how he lead and cared for a herd of sheep.

A shepherd on the other hand seems like a regular person that works hard and takes care and loves each of his sheep. We wouldn't be afraid to talk to a shepherd and could just be ourselves around him.

David knows that God isn't like the kings on earth so he compares Him to a loving shepherd taking care of his people so we can get a better picture of what God is like.

So, throughout this chapter even though David is talking about himself as a sheep. I think it was meant for us to read and see ourselves as the sheep and God as our shepherd.

After thinking about a shepherd I thought about sheep and how they completely rely on the shepherd for food, shelter and safety. Just like we need to rely on God.

You might think that your parents provide all this for you but your parents rely and trust in God to give them a job, money and blessings so they can give you what you need.

Another important point is that sheep don't know as much as a shepherd. If you really think about it sheep are pretty dumb compared to a shepherd. Compared to God we don't know too much either! God knows our future, He made us and the whole world.

God would prepare a banquet for David and protect him from his enemies. He would treat David like a royal guest and anoint him.

In those days people would get anointed to become king or if they were recognized as being someone special. David was trying to say that even though he was King, God recognized him as more than a king but as someone even more special to Him.

David ends by saying that he will continually be blessed by God with lots of goodness and love and he is looking forward to living with God forever.

God is our Shepherd-King and we are his sheep. God is guiding us, protecting us and He loves us. We don't know as much as God does so we have to trust Him.
