
"All Saints Day" annually reminds us of our connectedness as Christians. If you believe saints are statues in a church building, the Bible teaches something completely different.

The following are the minutes from the OCTOBER meeting of the Church Council. The minutes are available for you to help the entire church family Stay In The Know about how this group is caring for New Hope UMC!

Church Council Meeting Minutes - October 28, 2021

Present: Kevin Armstrong, Alicia Copeland, Robin Craun, Cindy Deavers, Wanda Harding, Pastor Mike, Bruce Rogers, Cindy Sheets, Dallas VanLear and Karen Whitmer

The meeting was called to order by chairman Dallas VanLear, with devotions and prayer by Alicia Copeland.

The minutes from the September meeting were accepted as distributed.

Finance Report: (Kevin Armstrong reported)

- ~ We are 78% through the year, and we have received 62% to meet our budget.
- ~ We are not spending like we used to, but we are trailing behind what we took in in donations during the 2020 year. Part of the reason for this is the fact that we are losing members. For this and other reasons, we are in a downward trend in donations.
- ~ We are still meeting the budget and Kevin recommended that we pay the apportionments for this month. Apportionments went up for next year, so we will continue to have to analyze our financial status, and we might have to make some changes in the future. Pastor Mike mentioned that the conference tried to keep the apportionment budget as tight as possible, but the Clergy Health Insurance went up and that was a big part of it.

<u>Treasurer's Report</u>: (Cindy Deavers reported)

- ~ All the giving has been reported through this Sunday.
- ~ All bills, payroll and apportionments have been paid.

- ~ On the Treasurer's Report, the Minister's Church Contribution which is the Pastor's Health Insurance is listed as: \$9,144. This amount was actually from the year 2020. The correct amount that should have been listed for this year (2021) was: \$10,644. And for next year (2022), it will increase to: \$10,927. Pastor Mike noted that this amount is based on the Pastor's salary.
 - Kevin made a motion to revise the budget to reflect what it should have been in 2021, and to also show the increase for 2022. Karen seconded the motion. After some slight discussion and clarification, it was passed by all persons present.
- ~ We have received \$1,655 in memorial donations in memory of Alice Ward and Henry Breeding. \$25 of that has been designated for music, but the rest is non-designated.
- ~ Cindy Deavers asked if it was okay to send the allotted end-of-the-year donations to our usual recipients: including: the District Mission Center, the Verona Food Pantry and 2 others which would total \$1,546. Approval was given for her to send the end-of-the-year donations.

Financial Secretary: (Robin Craun reported)

~ Robin expressed a need for a few more counters after worship on 1-2 Sundays each month. Wanda and Karen W. count the offerings 2-3 times a month and Kim and Karen Maugans count the tithes and offerings two times a month. It only takes about 15-20 minutes to perform this ministry and Robin is asking for a few more volunteers, so that those who are doing it now, won't have to do it as often.

Trustees: (Pastor Mike reported)

- ~ Corey Johnson and Sandy Wyrick have completed painting the church hallway leading into the kitchen.
- ~ Currently, we have had only one company come and submit a bid for the mowing of the church lawn next year.

Pastor's Report: (Pastor Mike reported)

- ~ Kids' Rock has been restarted. Thanks to Sam Brensinger and all the others who have helped her in this ministry. They will have Kids' Rock available every Sunday during worship, except when we have Holy Communion.
- ~ A new Bible Study started three weeks ago and 14 people are regularly participating, between both the afternoon and evening classes.

Worship: (Pastor Mike reported)

~ The Dunns will be performing at New Hope UMC on Sunday, November 14th during Sunday Morning Worship.

~ Advent starts the first Sunday after Thanksgiving, so we will need to work on getting a group of people who will be willing to put the Christmas tree up in the Sanctuary and the other Christmas decorations up in the Narthex.

United Methodist Men: (Bruce Rogers reported)

- ~ The UMM had their monthly meeting and the Circle of Hope provided their dinner. Fourteen men were in attendance, the most since we were shut down in 2020. Bruce thanked Wanda and the ladies for the food.
- ~ The UMM are in their third month of manning the New Hope Community Dump. They have received two checks of \$342 each for their efforts that will go towards their mission projects.
- ~ They are in talks to hold a Ladies Night again next year, and possibly a Christmas Dinner this year.

United Methodist Women: (Wanda Harding reported)

- ~ The UMW met on October 18th with guest speaker, Kelly Truxell, from the Creative Works Farm, Camp Light. They had 12 people attending for the program.
- ~ The Circle of Hope served a meal to the UMMen on October 21st, where 14 men were in attendance.
- ~ The UMMen had a workday in which seven men came to help out with flowers and other outside chores around the church. The UM Women had blueberry muffins and peanut butter cookies for them to snack on.
- ~ The UM Women and the UM Men are planning on sponsoring a church-wide Christmas Breakfast at 9:00am one Sunday Morning in December, date TBD.

Membership: (Karen Whitmer reported)

~ On Sunday, October 31st, we will be honoring the following 11 people who have already passed on to be with the Glory of God. Dallas closed the meeting, and Pastor Mike sent us off with prayer. The meeting ended at 7:13pm.



The old man hangs up his phone and turns to his wife. "Okay," he says, "they're coming for Thanksgiving and paying their own wav."







How Much Do You Suffer For His Name?

"But the Lord said to Ananias, "Go! This man is my chosen instrument to proclaim my name to the Gentiles and their kings and to the people of Israel. I will show him how much he must suffer for my name." *Acts* 9:15-16 NIV

"Are they servants of Christ? (I am out of my mind to talk like this.) I am more. I have worked much harder, been in prison more frequently, been flogged more severely, and been exposed to death again and again. Five times I received from the Jews the forty lashes minus one. Three times I was beaten with rods, once I was pelted with stones, three times I was shipwrecked, I spent a night and a day in the open sea, I have been constantly on the move. I have been in danger from rivers, in danger from bandits, in danger from my fellow Jews, in danger from Gentiles; in danger in the city, in danger in the country, in danger at sea; and in danger from false believers. I have labored and toiled and have often gone without sleep; I have known hunger and thirst and have often gone without food; I have been cold and naked. Besides everything else, I



face daily the pressure of my concern for all the churches. Who is weak, and I do not feel weak? Who is led into sin, and I do not inwardly burn?" 2 Corinthians 11:23-29 NIV

I want to say right off that this month's writing is going to be more pointed than the ones we have written in the past. We all have ups and downs in life. Whether I'm dealing with my own trouble, helping my wife with hers, or helping a friend and encouraging a fellow Christian, most of the time I turn to scripture in order to draw strength because I know I can count on it. A week or two ago I wanted to read about the suffering of the early church disciples and apostles. I can guarantee you nearly all of them could have had their names inserted somewhere in the above passage. As you read, Paul who wrote the second one and is who Jesus is referring to in the first endured more than most, if not all of us in our modern world ever will. All of the apostles and disciples (except for Judas) endured terrible things in order to spread the gospel. To tell the pagan world of 2000 years ago of the good news of Jesus Christ. Without that most likely we would not have Bibles today, or churches, crosses, we would all still be pagan sinners. If you are not a real Christian today, you would not be living in a culture that has been so incredibly molded by biblical teaching and philosophy. I really hope this month's article will challenge everybody who reads it. Because honestly if it doesn't then these writings are doing no good, and it is actually a disservice to Jesus Christ and all who have suffered for the Faith we claim to live.

I want to ask you a few questions, how sharp is your sword? Is your armor shiny or barely used and dusty? Or is it actually dented, dirty and bloody? Where has the bottom of your cross been drug through? Or is it actually stored away somewhere all nice and pretty? How tired are you from your burdens or helping your brother and sisters in Christ carry their burdens? Or are you a "well rested Christian", possibly so incredibly comfortable in your spiritual life that all of your spiritual armor looks brand new? Do you have scars from spiritual battles and war that Paul writes about in Ephesians 6? Or has our modern American life made you so delicate that you no longer share in the suffering for the name of Christ? Do you wish to carry no burdens or have it easy? Jesus promises his yoke is easy and his burden is light, but he still commands us to take up our cross daily, and after all it is still a burden though with him it is lighter than the burdens of sin and this world. The apostles rejoiced from being worthy to suffer for the name of Jesus Christ. I could be wrong but maybe that's why Christianity is no longer respected today. Maybe people who need the real message of Christ don't see it in us who are supposed to live it and glorify God in our suffering. If we don't, why should they?

Don't misunderstand me please, for I am an American as well. I am proud of my country and everything our national heritage entails. Our nation helped save the world twice, we have lots to be proud of. But at the same time I feel like our American culture and all of our conveniences have really hurt our spiritual lives. If you are a real Christian it's not hard to see how far our country has drifted from our moral anchor. If you get too wrapped up in our American habits, trust me you will see that you are drifting from your spiritual and moral anchor.

I heard a story from a missionary in a sermon on YouTube recently. He was telling a story about a young man named Andrew in Africa in a church their ministry had helped start. The church was in a Muslim culture, and one day Muslims who were persecuting them literally took Andrew outside of the church and demanded he deny Jesus Christ. Although he was petrified, he told them he couldn't and would not deny Jesus. They shot him and left him with a mortal wound to die. That story has pierced my conscience ever since I heard it.

How much have we knowingly or unknowingly denied Christ in our everyday lives? Not even looking at the compromises we make with modern culture today, how many times have we been suffering and going through hard things and we are so quick to question why God is letting us go through something so bad? I can tell you I am embarrassed by how much I've denied Christ in my life. But I made a choice that even though I know I will still stumble and fall, I'm going to stand on the Rock of Christ. And to borrow this statement he is so big and strong that when you fall you don't completely fall down into the dirt, you fall into him if he is where you are. Please join me in repentance and let's be real soldiers in the army of the Lord. No matter what they say this world still needs a hero. Let's show them that Jesus Christ is who they need. And if you have never repented, please do and your sufferings will take a whole new meaning.

place with our own words, our needs, thanks, praise, and what we're sorry for.

This is how Jesus told us we should pray:

Our Father which art in heaven, Hallowed be thy name.

Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done on earth, as it is in heaven.

Today we're learning about how God would like us to pray. Even Jesus' closest friends, the disciples wanted to know how to pray. The disciples were with Jesus all the time and were with him when he went to pray and heard his prayers to God as well, yet they still weren't sure how they were supposed to do it.

Before Jesus teaches the prayer he has a few things to say first. He says that we should keep our prayers simple. God listens to us no matter if our prayers are long or short and if you just don't have the right words God knows what we mean (and we don't need to use fancy words either)!

Jesus also mentions that we shouldn't 'show off' when we pray. He said this to the people that used to stand on the street corners praying so that everyone would see how 'great' they were. God doesn't want us to pray so people can see us or to hear how great we can pray. He wants us to pray in a quiet Give us this day our daily bread.

And forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors.

And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil: For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, forever. Amen.

This prayer might be a little tough to understand when you first hear it, but we're going to go through it and try to explain what it means.

Our Father which art in heaven means we're praying to our father who is in heaven. We start the prayer out this way so we know that we're praying to God our father and we're not alone. God likes it when we call him father and he wants us to talk to him like we talk to our own father. God is our loving father and we are his special children.

Hallowed be thy name is next and it means holy is your name. Even though God wants us to call him our father, he is still God. It's sometimes really hard to understand who God is and what he's like. How did he make us? How is he perfect and never makes mistakes? God just wants us to remember that we need to treat him super special because he is God and when we pray to him we need to be respectful.

Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done in earth, as it is in heaven. If we think about where God lives, we know its pretty great. The Bible says that in heaven there will be no more crying, God will live with us, and there will be no hunger or hurt there.

This part of the prayer says let your kingdom come. Let your will be done in earth, as it is in heaven. This means we are praying that people would live in peace and love with one another the way it is in heaven. It reminds us that we should be living the way God wants us to everyday.

Give us this day our daily bread means give us today all that we need. Keep in mind that these are things that we can't live without. We don't *need* video games and princess dolls those are the things that we want, we need food, water and shelter.

Even though we pray for things we need, that doesn't mean we'll get them. There are still people with no food in many parts of the world but that doesn't mean we stop praying for these things. When we ask God for things that means we trust Him and we'll leave the decision to God.

And forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors. This next part of the prayer is asking for forgiveness for our mistakes. Forgiveness means that we are sorry for something we've done and we don't want to do it anymore. But we also need to forgive people who have done wrong to us. Sometimes others hurt us very badly, so we need to ask God to help us forgive them because it's really hard or we don't want to. If we forgive others, God will forgive us.

And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. Is it sometimes tempting to do something you're not supposed to? This part of the prayer is really neat because it asks God to help us to know the right thing to do. To protect us against the evil that is in the world and keep us away from it.

For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever. Amen. The last part of the prayer is the best part! For yours is the kingdom means that Heaven will last forever and will always be God's. God also has all the power and all the glory FOREVER! It makes me happy knowing that God will never die and he's the strongest and greatest. With God we will always win!

Anyone can read the Lord's prayer, so it's important to think about what you're saying. When you pray "give us this day your daily bread" think about all the things you have to be thankful for and how God has given you everything you need, or things you need to ask for or pray for others. When you pray "forgive us our debts" ask forgiveness for those things you did wrong.

Prayer is our special way of talking to God so remember to pray as many times as you can. God loves you and wants to know everything about you and how you're doing.
